Her life mission is for others to know that they are "loved, valued and created for a purpose" and to equip + empower others to discover true intimacy with Jesus and find their true identity in Him.</p>	<p>Finding Balance: Work, Rest and Play</p> <p>One of the primary things that I have discovered over the past 13 years is that to reach others well - I must BE well. I have learned, the hard way in many cases, that when my relationship with Him isn't priority then everything else very quickly gets out of line as well. I want to share with you some personal stories and some biblical principles and some scriptural keys to prioritizing Him, looking after YOU and others, finding balance and learning that there is great beauty and freedom (for you and others) in work + rest + play.</p>

She holds degrees from Harvard and Yale Law School.</p>	<p>Data Analysis of Cross-Border Trafficking in Nepal and India</p> <p>Tiny Hands Nepal operates 20 border-monitoring stations in Nepal, where it identifies and assists victims trafficked across the border into India. This presentation analyzes over four years of data collected from thousands of intercepted victims, including demographics of the victims (such as age, gender, education, and employment), motives for going abroad, recruitment methods, relationships to traffickers, routes, and destinations. This presentation will identify trends and compare them with the prevailing understanding of trafficking in Nepal.</p>

Paddy also comes from a teaching background.</p> <p>The Chrisps had previously served two years in the Philippines working under Filipino missionaries in very relevant ministries to ministry life here in the Gambia (Muslim, Prostitution, Trafficking and Youth).</p>	<p>Necessary and Profitable: Producing Women's Recyclable Sanitary Pads</p> <p>Thousands of young women suffer through lack of access to sanitary pads, from humiliating embarrassment to missing out on their all-important educational opportunities. Women also need an alternative income source that is guaranteed to be self-sustainable. This workshop will share practical information about how to collect raw materials, construct and market recyclable sanitary pads--which serve the dual purpose of providing a necessary product--and an economic resource. In addition, working together on this project is occupational therapy, relationship building and fun.</p>

Research shows that all the characteristics disadvantage someone when it comes to receiving proper health care. Studying the barriers that they deal with will give insight into one of the most disadvantaged populations when it comes to health care and begin to answer unexplored questions about how all the factors of race, mental health, and sex work interact with each other to especially disadvantage this specific African American population. In this workshop, we will explore how trauma shapes basic childhood questions, such as "am I lovable"? Primary and secondary emotions experienced through trauma form false narratives that interrupt how love and desire are experienced with God and others. She officially moved to Bangkok in February of 2007. She began working with Thai women and men wanting out of the sex industry but the last four years, she's been focused on helping the ladyboys working in the red-light districts.</p>	<p>STORIES IN GRACE--An Effective Tool for Sharing Jesus' Compassion with Victims of Trauma</p> <p>"Storytelling, which both by-passes the issue of literacy and has proven effective worldwide, is the primary method used in the thirty-six lesson, trauma-sensitive Stories in Grace curriculum. The "storybook" or "textbook" is the Campus Crusade MAGDALENA film which is available in 147 languages. The film consists of 44 stories or film segments—36 of which are used in the curriculum—about Jesus' compassionate and healing ministry to the deeply wounded and hurting women of His day. Each of the 36 lessons is taught using the standard Six-Step Lesson Format which includes questions, graphics, class activities, and Bible verses relevant to the specific story being studied. A multi-media power point presentation will be used to demonstrate this curriculum.</p>

For decades upon decades we have either avoided talking about sex or have talked about it in tandem with shame. In this workshop, we will re-discover what scripture says on purity, modesty and sex. The film depicts the dramatic emotional costs experienced by professional providers such as nurses, social workers, clinical psychologists, doctors, firefighters, first responders who rescue, assist, and when possible heal the injured and traumatized. Through dramatic stories, CAREGIVERS film probes the emotionally risky aspects of professional caregiving and public service.</p> <p>We ask the question: How is the professional care provider affected emotionally and physically, and who helps him or her?! The audience will discover that engaged empathic caregiving can sometimes be an occupational hazard; we explore the painful and human sides of these professions and the professionals' response to trauma known as Compassion Fatigue or Secondary Traumatic Stress.
